

CARL SANDBURG WILL LECTURE IN DETROIT

Carl Sandburg, America's most American poet, with his famous guitar, will entertain the Detroit Town Hall Series in a lecture-recital of "Songs, Poems, and Stories" next Wednesday at 11 o'clock at the Wilson Theater.

As poet, biographer and storyteller, Sandburg sings of America, her parables, her cities, her Lincoln, her children, her art, her romanticism and realism. He is an enthusiastic collector of American folk melodies, and author of "The American Song Bag," an acknowledged classic, the history of our country in song.

Sandburg's "Abraham Lincoln," "The Prairie Years" is designated by the Book List of the American Library Association as "The most understanding" biography of Lincoln.

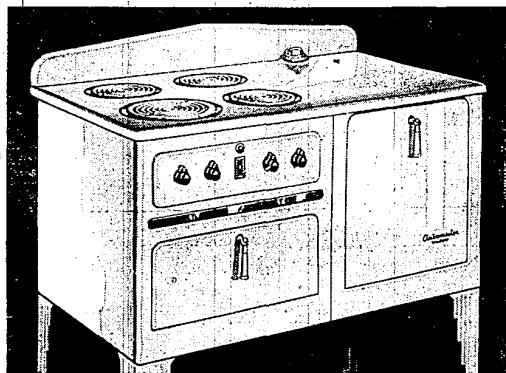
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
