Dairy Farmers Will Get More For Milk

(Continued from page one)
in the old code which was \$1.85
per cwt. for fluid milk sales, less
deductions for equalizing, hauling,
pool and dues. (This price gave
Farmington producers a net price
for base milk of 3.5 test from
\$1.25 to \$1.39 per cwt., depending
on local hauling rates.)

Seek \$2.10 Price

This part of the agreement fix-
ing this price, was rejected by the
sales committee. A sub-committee
of seven was selected to fix on a
price which would be requested of
the administration. This sub com-
mittee agreed on a price of \$2.10
per base milk. After some discus-
sion this price was adopted with
the recommendation that a com-
mittee of producers be sent to
Washington to try and obtain this
higher price.

On Monday another meeting of
the sales committee was held. At
the meeting in Detroit, which this
group of producers who had made
the trip to Washington including
John Adams, Bert Williams and
Walter Cook, all of Oakland
County, reported on what they had
been able to accomplish. They had
gathered several days in Washington
and after many conferences with
government officials had been
able to obtain a small increase
over the price provided for at
first. This raise is expected to
mean approximately a 10 per cent
advance over the present price.

Oppose Approval

This sales committee meeting
was attended by several hundred
producers, the majority of whom
seemed to favor the rejection of
this agreement, and the demand
ing a price which would return the
cost of production to the former,
but the sales committee, guided by the statements of Mr.
Adams, Mr. Cook and Mr. William
Shinn, that in their judgment this
was the very best increase in price
which the administration would
sanction, voted 40 to 4 to accept
their recommendation.

This is the present standing of
the situation. The dealers who sell
milk will undoubtedly demand a
hearing before the administration
authorities but it is not anticipat-
ed that any substantial changes
will be made as affecting the pro-
ducer, and it is hoped that the
agreement may go into effect by
March 1.
