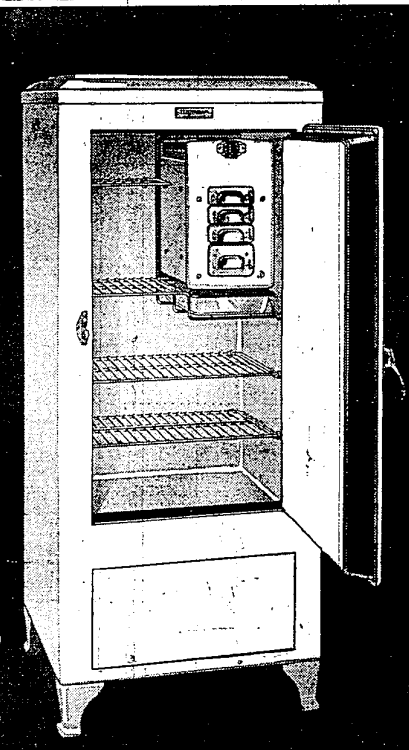

**MURDERS PROVE NEED FOR TELETYPEWRITERS**

Bill Introduced in Bay State After Killings in Hold-up Requires Wire Service

As a result of the robbery of the Needham, Mass., Trust Company last winter, when two policemen were shot and killed, a bill has been introduced in the Massachusetts Legislature requiring all cities and towns in the state having organized police forces to equip their departments with teletypewriter machines connected with the state-wide police teletypewriter network.

Proved a Costly Economy

Needham had had this equipment, but last summer, in an effort to economize, the teletypewriter service was given up. It turned out to be a costly economy.

If the service had been available, valuable time would have been saved in flashing the alarm of the crime, and this, in turn, might have led to the apprehension of the criminals. As it was, a telephone call first had to be made to the police force in Dedham, where teletypewriter service was still available, and the message was then sent out from the Dedham office.

Service Since Re-installed

Needham and some other municipalities in Massachusetts which had dispensed with the teletypewriter service, as an economy measure, have since re-installed this service, but the bill in the Massachusetts Legislature provides that the service shall be mandatory in all communities.

The Word "Impeachment"

The meaning of the word "impeachment" is accusation, and to say that a President was impeached means that he was accused of certain acts by a method laid down in the Constitution. Andrew Johnson was so impeached, but was acquitted.
