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Farmers' Union Will Hold Meeting May 17

The next Farmers' Union meeting will be held Thursday evening, May 17th, at the Wixom Community Hall. At the request of Union members at Wixom, Walter Nelson has been engaged as the speaker.

The last meeting, held May 3rd at West Bloomfield Town Hall, was addressed by Leslie H. Kay, president of the Pontiac Chamber of Labor, and Harry S. Atchinson of the Salem Local.

Mr. Kay posed the question why he as a workman could buy so little of the farmers' products and why the farmer finds it difficult to buy the products of the factory. His analysis of the situation for solution provided plenty of food for thought.

Mr. Atchinson talked about his experience as a member of the Milk Committee that went to Washington last January. He expressed his conviction that independent business men, especially in the small towns, should be in sympathy with the Farmers' Union movement, since their own prosperity depends so much on the welfare of the farmers.

POPPY DAY WILL STIR MEMORIES OF WAR VETERANS

The memorial poppies which the women of the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute here on "Poppy Day," Saturday, May 26th, will recall vivid pictures to the minds of World War veterans who served overseas. The poppies blooming amid the waste and destruction of the battle front, and among the bare graves of the dead, left an unforgettable impression on the American soldiers.

"When the American divisions drove forward in the great offensives of 1918, they entered a region torn, desolated and trampled by the most tremendous battles of history. Destruction and death were everywhere but amid it all the little wild poppies bloomed on. When machine gun and shell fire took its toll from the American ranks, the poppy was nature's floral offering on the graves of the dead. To us those poppies seemed to symbolize the brave spirit of our fallen comrades and when we returned home we made the poppy the memorial flower of The American Legion." Poppies to be worn in tribute to the men who gave their lives for America in the World War will be offered on the streets throughout the city Saturday, May 26th, by the American Legion Auxiliary women. Men of the Legion are co-operating in promotion of the project. The poppies, paper replicas of the flowers that grew on the battle fields, have been made by disabled veterans at Veteran's Hospital of Battle Creek. All contributions received for the poppies will be devoted to the rehabilitation and welfare work of the Legion and Auxiliary among the disabled veterans and the dependent families of veterans.

A Flower Show will be held at the Salem Evangelical Church, June 14. It will be sponsored by the Farmington Garden Club.

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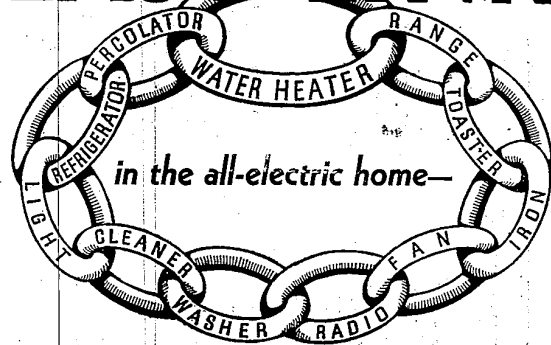
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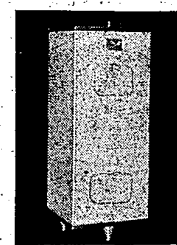
