APPLE TRIFLE

Peel, core and quarter some good tart apples of nice flavor, and stew with a strip of orange and a strip of quince peel, sufficient water to cover the bottom of the stewpan, and sugar in the proportion of half a pound of fruit; when cooked, press the pulp through a sieve, and, when cool, dish and cover with one pint of whipped cream flavored with lemon peel. Quince prepared in the same manner are equally as good.

APPLE SNOW

Stew some fine-flavored sour apples tender, sweeten to taste, strain them through a fine wire sieve and break into one pint of strained apples the white of an egg; whisk the apple and egg very briskly till quite stiff and it will be as white as snow; eaten with a nice boiled custard it makes a very desirable dessert. More eggs may be used if liked.

GREEN APPLE-PIE

Peel, core and slice tart apples enough for a pie; sprinkle over about three tablespoonsful of sugar, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, a small level tablespoonful of sifted flour, two tablespoonsful of water, a few bits of butter, stir all together with a spoon; put it into a pie-tin lined with pie paste; cover with a top crust and bake about forty minutes.
