## CELEBRATION IN FARMINGTON IS ENJOYED BY MANY

Farmington's combination Apple Blossom Festival and Bank Opening Day was enjoyed by a large gathering in town and was approving comment from many outside the community.

Decoration of the streets and buildings, ably carried out by Lloyd Gullen, caused much favorable comment, with branches in some cases apple trees, along Grand River. At the bank opening ceremony, President Grosvenor of the Exchange Club expressed the hope that the first deposit, with those it would follow, would be "Like the little acorn from which a great oak grows." Music and drilling followed, by the band and the drum and bugle corps of Detroit Edison Co. Legionnaires. In the evening the dance and drawing for prizes held chief interest.

Funeral services for Fred Hitchcock, a former resident of North Farmington, were held Tuesday afternoon at Kingston where burial was made.

Mr. Hitchcock was 43 years old and formerly managed a store at North Farmington. His wife and four children survive. A cousin, Lawrence Brown, owns a store on the corner of Orchard Lake and Fourteen Mile Roads.

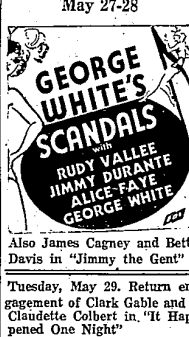

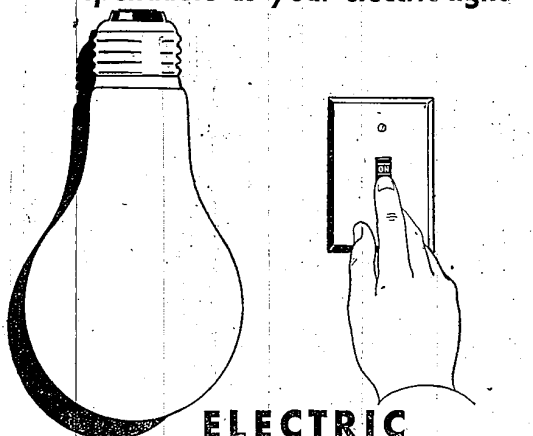

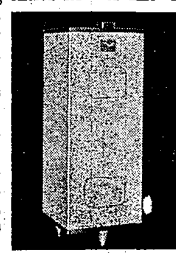
