own defense and as an adverse witness called by the plaintiff; Carl Fors, former State Bank examiner; Mr. Daley; George C. Gildemeister, former assistant cashier of the bank; Mr. Upton and Allen H. F. Martindale, former director.

In the suit, the plaintiff seeks to have set aside a transaction in September, 1931, whereby a mortgage held by the bank against property of Mr. Blanchard was cancelled, through the applying to it of deposits of relatives of Mr. Blanchard and members of his household. The 90-day clause was in effect at that time. Mr. Blanchard's defense is that the mortgage arose entirely out of an effort on the part of himself and the late Charles H. Ely to recoup for the bank a loss he would have suffered on purchase of bonds.
