Havana Third Capital
Havana is the third city to serve as the capital of Cuba. Barcelona, on the northern coast of the island, near its easternmost tip, was the first capital, established by Diego de Velazquez in 1512. Two years later, Velazquez transferred the headquarters to Santiago, which remained the second capital until 1561. Meanwhile, the original Havana was founded in 1514, near the site of what is now known as the town of Bataban, on the south coast, and about 50 miles from Havana. This infant city bore the lengthy title of "San Cristobal de la Habana."

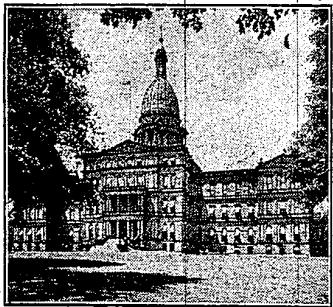
