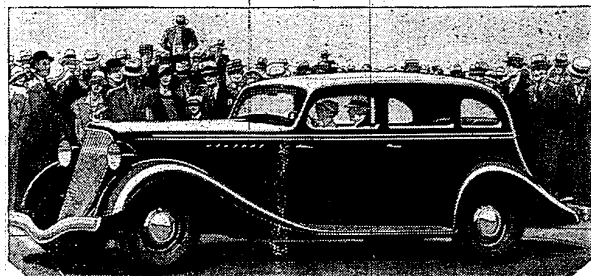
### Former Farmington Girl Wed in Brighton

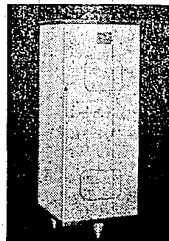
