Moore Seeks Second Term

Senator Andrew L. Moore, who
has represented the Twelfth Dis-
trict for the past two years, an-
nounces his candidacy for renomina-
tion at the fall primaries.

Senator Moore has been one of
the most active Republican legis-
lators in Lansing and has either
sponsored or supported many bills
that have become law.

The following is a portion of the
legislative record of Senator
Moore:

Introduced and secured the pas-
sage of the Moore-Holbeck delin-
quent tax bill—thus saving from
tax sale thousands of homes and
farms.

Secured the repeal of the Covert
Road law.

Introduced and secured the pas-
sage of a bill making it possible to
pay delinquent taxes, with bonds.

Voted to abolish the State Prop-
erty tax on real estate.

Voted to lower the interest rate
on small loans.

Renewed and advocated the pas-
sage of the Land Contract and
Mortgage Moratorium laws.

Assisted in the passage of the bill
making it impossible for tax title
sharks to purchase taxes returned
to the Auditor General.

Supported the bill to extend to
November 1st the time for paying
1933 taxes.

Refused to support the "Insur-
rence Bond Bill", unless it was
submitted to the people for their
approval.

Supported every measure that
was designed to lower government
costs and reduce taxes.

Was recognized by Republicans
and Democrats alike, as the best

informed man in the legislature; on
the question of taxation.

Was selected by the Legislative
Council and the Governor to go
to Europe to study the European
system of taxation. This trip was
made entirely at Mr. Moore's own
expense. Not one cent of the cost
was paid by the State.
