Annual School Report

Annual meeting held in S. C. A. Hall at 8:50 o'clock, July 9, 1934. Mrs. Eva V. Tesch, President, in chair. All members present. Motion by Russel Perry supported by Mr. Joe Doe that the School Board ascertain the date of 1935 annual meeting and place of same. Motion carried. President Mrs. Eva Tesch declared a Recess until Secretary get the Dates from School House Vaults. Meeting continued as Date was placed on minutes of 1933 annual meeting. Motion carried. Motion by Mr. Cate supported by Mrs. Fannie Grey to accept report on cash receipt and cash disbursement for 1933 and 1934 as read by Secretary. Motion carried.

President Mrs. Eva Tesch appointed Tellers: Mr. Herb Bondy, Mr. Hugo Berns, Mr. Cate; Challengers, Mrs. Gray as Secretary for Fall Book of Voters. Three officers to be elected; one to fill vacancy. Nominations declared open by President Mrs. Eva V. Tesch. Mrs. Otto Esler nominated Mr. Russel Perry to serve for one year; seconded by Mr. T. J. Hamill; motion to close nominations by Mr. Elmer Hardow; seconded by Mr. Wagstaff; carried.

Votes cast: Russel Perry, 31; Frank Cote, 1; Katin Gray, 1. Mr. Perry was elected to serve one year. Mrs. Russel Perry nominated Mr. L. J. Hamill for a term of 3 years; seconded by Mr. Shelton. Motion by Mrs. Howard Kennedy supported by Hugo Berns that nominations be closed. Carried. Mr. Kennedy, Mr. F. Cote, Elmer Hardow, declined. Vote cast: 24.

J. Hamill—21. Frank Cote—3. Mr. L. J. Hamill elected for a term of 3 years. Mr. H. Kennedy nominated Mr. Elmer Hardow; seconded by Mr. Herb Bondy.

Mr. Fultz nominated Mr. Oscar Mullen; seconded by Mr. L. J. Hamill. Mr. Howard Kennedy moved that nominations be closed; seconded by Mrs. H. Kennedy. Votes cast—42. Elmer Hardow—24. Oscar Mullen—15. Frank Cote—3. Mr. Hardow elected for a term of 3 years.

Motion by Mr. Herb Bondy, supported by Mr. August A. Miller that school board officers' salaries remain same as 1933-34. Votes cast tied.

Motion by Mr. Elmer Hardow, supported by Mr. Wagstaff that we vote by ballot on officers' salary to remain the same as last year. Votes cast: Yes 21; No 17. The salary remains the same as last year.

Motion by Mr. Howard Kennedy, supported by Mr. Otto Esler that the length of term of school year be left to the school board discretion. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Hamill, supported by Hardow that the District furnish text books for John Grace School District Nine. Mr. Hardow withdrew his support. Motion by Mr. Hardow, supported by Mrs. Joe Doe that District pay for text books for John Grace School only. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Hamill, supported by Mr. Sam Reel to pay high school tuition not to exceed \$80.00 per pupil. Motion carried.

Water question was brought up, several remarks in this regard but no action taken. Motion by Mrs. Kennedy, supported by Mrs. Hardow to adjourn. Carried at 11:40.

"As a youth, Mr. Power, now 73 years old, recalls that he attended the old Meeting House which adjoined the cemetery and which is now incorporated in a dwelling on the same site. "Men and women, divided by a partition, sat on opposite sides of the church. There were no preachers or regular speakers. The worshippers sat silent until they were incited by God to speak when one of their number arose and voiced whatever noble thought inspired him," he recalls. "One other direct descendant of the pioneer founder still lives in the city—She is Miss Marjorie Power, a cousin of the city clerk. "Mr. Power has two grown children to carry on the family name but neither lives in Farmington. Pride in his family and its accomplishments has caused Mr. Power to make an intensive study of the City's history and he is popularly known as the 'Farmington Historian.'
