Very little attention has been paid in the past by motorists to the fact that the motor vehicle operators' license law requires motorists to register changes of address with the chief of police or sheriff.

If this is not done, the motorist is not properly licensed.

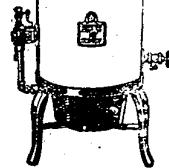

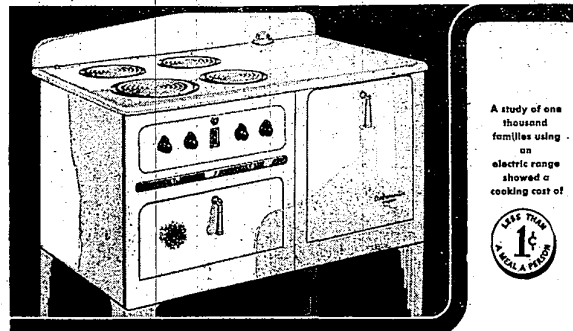
