TELEPHONE ECONOMY—Paradeville, Wis., Times

The last three fires to which Paradeville Community truck has responded have been at homes without telephone service, according to Orris O. Smith, local fire chief, who is urging rural and village residents to install this much-needed utility as a safeguard against just such occasions as the foregoing.

"I believe the installation of telephone facilities in every home served by the village and community fire trucks would decrease the loss by fire to a considerable extent," commented the local department head. "Perhaps we have been over-economizing a bit in discontinuing telephone service while warring with the depression. If loss of life or property results from failure to notify quickly those agencies organized for our protection, then such economy becomes rather an expensive experiment. Like automobiles and electricity, the telephone has seemingly become a necessity in the American home."
