The hearts of the young men in the dressing gown were transmitted 700 miles by telephone wire, from the home office of an insurance company in Washington, D. C., to a convention of insurance agents in St. Louis, Mo., so that they might listen in on a typical physical examination.

Even the gentle beating of a young man's heart in springtime now goes speeding over 700 miles of a telephone circuit and lands in a room where 150 people are listening. That is exactly what happened the other day during a recent insurance convention.


The convention was in Washington, D. C. The occasion was a regional convention in St. Louis of 150 field representatives of the Acea Mutual Life Insurance Company, to whom the home office, in Washington, wanted to demonstrate a bit of home office "atmosphere."

As many as six persons, located in different parts of the room, took part in the demonstration at Washington. A high quality heterodynamic microphone replaced the transmitter at the Washington end of the circuit and a hand set was

used in place of the receiver. A loud speaker, with an associated telephone, was used at the St. Louis end of the circuit.

One of the scenes transmitted was the examination of an applicant for life insurance. The examining doctor in Washington heard the beats of a perfect heart, and so did 150 people at St. Louis. The beat of the applicant's heart was not so good, having a plainly audible heart murmur due to impaired valvular action. So perfect was the transmission that the listeners at St. Louis could tell this for themselves, without being told. The officials in Washington felt that it would not be possible to take the entire medical and under-writing staff to St. Louis, except by telephone. The transmission of heart beats proved entirely satisfactory.

It Isn't the Heat, It's Humidity That Bothers Glass Insulators Too



Telephone wires are supported by glass insulators mounted on the crossarms of telephone poles. When the weather is humid, a film of moisture forms on the surface of the insulator—the thicker the film—the more electric current leaks away. Important factors governing the amount of leakage are the chemical nature of the glass, its age and shape, and the amount and kind of dirt on its surface. This photograph shows a rack of glass insulators being exposed to the weather on the roof of the Bell Telephone Laboratories in New York, where tests are being carried on to determine the most efficient type of insulator.
