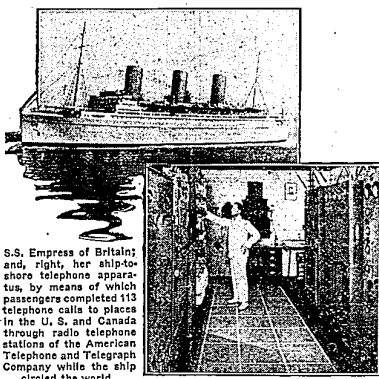

Passengers on World Cruise Liner Call Home Cities from Far Places

Another striking example of the rapid progress being made in commercial radio telephony has been furnished by the recent round-the-world cruise of the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain. At frequent intervals throughout the voyage the ship maintained contact with the radio telephone stations of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company at San Francisco and New York, enabling more than 100 of her passengers to talk with friends and relatives in every quarter of the United States as well as points in Canada. In all, 115 calls were completed.

The Empress left New York on January 4 on an eastward voyage around the world and back to New York again by way of Suez and the Straits of Malacca. This ship is one of the transatlantic liners having telephone service with the Bell System, and arrangements were made to keep in touch with the radio telephone stations at New York and San Francisco throughout the voyage.

The feature of the record made by the ship was the telephone calls completed while she was on the opposite side of the world. Between Singapore and Hongkong, a total of 40 calls was completed to points in

Massachusetts, California, Texas, Florida, Wisconsin and numerous other parts of this country as well as Canada. Most of these calls involved radio and wire circuits of 10,000 miles or more in length. One call to Halifax, N. S., near the Pacific and the American continent, covered a distance of nearly 13,000 miles. As the ship rounded Borneo and steamed up past the Philippines and the China coast, passengers called up New York, Palm Beach, Houston and a score of other places in the United States.

Calls were completed from numerous other points along the route: in the Atlantic, off Asia Minor, in the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean, and at various points across the Pacific Ocean. Until the ship reached Ceylon, contact was maintained through the ship-to-shore stations at New York. Thereafter the ship swung over to the transpacific stations at San Francisco, through which traffic was routed until the ship reached the Panama Canal.

The Empress has a transmitter rated at about 500 watts. The radio channels are short wave, somewhat below the 100-meter band. The shore stations have a power of about 15 kilowatts and employ directional antennas.

CHEVROLET 1934 OUTPUT RUNNING FAR BEYOND 1933

World production of Chevrolet cars during the month of June totaled 95,147 units, making the company's production for the first six months of this year 525,093 units or nearly 50 per cent greater than the first half of 1933, according to an announcement made

by the officials of the Chevrolet Motor Company.

Despite this obviously high production for the first half of 1934, there is still a shortage of Chevrolet cars in the field, officials stated. During the month of June more than a dozen solid trainload shipments were moved into as many key cities in various parts of the country in an effort to catch up on unfilled orders. Plans call for duplicating these shipments in additional cities soon.

Chevrolet's production maintained a steady pace during the early part of July. Figures released by company officials today showed that domestic and export production for the week ending July 11 totaled 23,089 units, a better daily average than was achieved in June.

Chevrolet's record-breaking sales continued their advances in June shattering all monthly records since May 1931, and achieving the highest June total since 1923, officials of the Chevrolet Motor Company announced. Retail sales for the month, as compiled from dealer's reports, were the basis of the announcement.

BETTER CONDITIONS IN AUTO INDUSTRY FOR FIRST PERIOD

According to Department of State certificate of title records, 77,046 more automobile sales were made in Michigan in 1934 up to June 15 than were made during the same period in 1933.

Records show that this year up to June 15, a total of 65,232 certificates of title were issued on new automobiles as compared with 38,535 certificates of title for the same period last year.

The biggest increase in business, however, is shown in the demand for titles for used cars. This

year 177,734 titles were issued as compared with 27,885 titles in 1933.

Another evidence of improved conditions is reflected in the decrease in the number of repossessions. Until June 15, 1934, a total of 4,237 repossessed cars was reported to the department as compared with 5,914 for the same period a year ago.
