In an effort to ascertain data relative to the use of copper plates, special test plates have been made up and are being used on cars belonging to Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald and other executives of the department. As the cost of copper in past years has been the one factor preventing the use of this metal, the tests are aimed to determine how light a plate may be made and still possess sufficient durability.
