STAGGERED OPEN SEASON
IS THOUGHT PROBABLE

If the final recommendations of the Bureau of Biological Survey are accepted by President Roosevelt, Michigan hunters will have to observe a staggered 30-day open season on migratory waterfowl beginning in both peninsulas on Oct. 3 and ending Nov. 11 with lawful hunting of waterfowl on Mondays and Tuesdays during this period.

This is the latest word received by the State Department of Conservation from the Bureau of Biological Survey at Washington.
