## Chevrolet Production Is Largest In August

Detroit, Sept. 12.—The largest August production for five years, totaling 74,437 units for all plants, is reported by the Chevrolet Motor Company. This total includes domestic, export and Canadian production.

For the first eight months of 1934 Chevrolet production totaled 692,477, and exceeds by 66,290 the 1933 twelve months' total, which was passed early last month.

Retail sales reported by dealers took a decided upward turn in the last ten days of August, promising continued demand in September. The reported deliveries in the United States exceeded the domestic production.

### TELEPHONE INSTALLED JUST IN TIME TO REPORT FIRE

A telephone was installed for the Cleary family in Lowell, Mass., late one day recently and was put to unexpected use almost immediately. The first call to go over the new telephone was to the fire department, when the gas stove in the kitchen burst into flames. 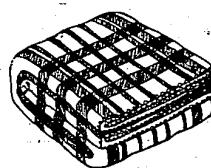
## TROUT FISHING NOT AS GOOD AS IN OTHER YEARS

The closing of the regular trout fishing season Labor Day will find many Michigan fishermen convinced that trout fishing generally was not as good this year as in some former seasons, but that there are still plenty of trout in the streams.

Although many good catches have been reported, complaints of poor fishing have been common. Many conservationists, however, are awaiting with interest the reports on creel census cards, which will give a comparison of this year's catches with other years. The information will be tabulated by the Institute for Fisheries Research, Ann Arbor.

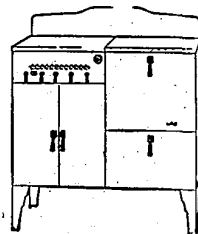
