## AUTO REGISTRATION SHOWS INCREASE IN STATE OF MICHIGAN

For the first time since 1929, the number of passenger cars in Michigan is showing an increase over the previous year's registration.

On Sept. 30, 1934 records of the Department of State disclose 999,074 automobiles registered for use during August, 1934, than during August, 1933, according to records of the department of state.

The increase in registration is attributed to two causes. The first is the two-payment plan of purchase license plates, sponsored by Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald in 1933, which permitted thousands of motorists to keep their cars in use.

The second cause for the increased registration is the reduction in weight tax rates.

## Sale of Automobiles Shows Large Increase

Sales of new automobiles in Michigan were nearly 55,000 more during August, 1934, than during August, 1933, according to records of the department of state. Last month 13,540 certificates of title were issued on new cars while during August, 1933, only 9,469 titles were issued. The sale of used cars, however, showed a slight decrease with titles on 34,093 being transferred during the month or 2,206 less than during August a year ago.

## More Than Half Million Drivers Need Licenses

Slightly more than 500,000 Michigan automobile drivers must secure new motor vehicle operators' licenses before Jan. 1, 1935.

From May 1, 1931, when the new drivers' license law became effective until Jan. 1, 1932, a total of 765,093 were granted licenses. Since May 1, this year 255,000 have secured new licenses as the old ones expired.

The department of state is issuing licenses at the rate of 3,500 a day at the present time.

## Lineman Calls Aid, Speeds Help to Five Caught in Blazing Mine Shaft

The afternoon of April 3 was much the same as any afternoon to the miners deep in the subterranean caverns of the Sinclair mine near Switz City, Ind. Work was going along about as usual. Five miners were busy digging and loading with coal the little car which "Prince," the mine pony, was to haul to the shaft. All seemed as usual when suddenly from Thomas Barnett, driver of the car, came the dreaded cry, "Fire!"

Unless help came and came quickly, death for all of them was only a few hours away. All they could do was close off the fire and the fumes as best they could, and wait, and hope.

Telephone Man Hurries to Mine

Meanwhile, above ground, frantic rescue efforts were going forward. The nearest telephone, however, was located in a farmhouse a quarter of a mile from the mine and it took time to go that distance.

Equipment and other help from nearby towns.

It happened that Charles Tubby, a plant man for the Indiana Bell Telephone Company, was testing toll lines in the Bloomfield central office. When the alarm came in, he hurried to the scene. He found there

was no telephone in the vicinity of the mine, but that the toll line between Vincennes and Indianapolis passed directly in front of the mine property. Climbing the nearest pole, he picked up an idle circuit with his toll line test set and, from this pole, talked to various towns in the western part of the state, in an effort to locate the United States Mine Rescue Squad, mine inspectors and first aid men.

Sent Many Important Messages

He continued his efforts to obtain help, and help came but only men, but materials such as lumber, nails and cloth to use to direct air into the mine. By this time traffic on the road had become so heavy that it was necessary for him to summon the sheriff of the county and the state police.

During all this time, no report had been received as to whether the entombed miners were still alive. The rescue workers labored for several hours, when finally they came knowing that the men were alive. Word of this was at once flashed to operators in Bloomfield and Linton by the volunteer telephone worker at the mine, and also to the Linton newspaper. After great difficulty, not only were the five men brought up, but also the pony.

## Oil Industry Gains In Michigan Fields

That the oil industry is to be a permanent part of Michigan's business life, is shown by the fact that several new "crude oil refineries" have been granted licenses by the gasoline tax division of the department of state in recent months. All of the new plants will refine nothing but Michigan crude oils.

Because of the fact that many new producing wells have been capped to comply with restrictions on crude oil output, it is impossible to determine the actual gain in production during the past year. Despite the restrictions, extensive exploration work is being conducted in many sections of the state in an effort to locate new pools.
