Homemaker's Corner

Low producers in the farm poultry flock can help cut the family food budget and home economies food specialists of Michigan State College recommend that such poultry be converted into delicious future meals by preserving them by canning.

Canning chicken requires little effort, and, when properly done, changes old hens into tender, well flavored meat. The fowl is drawn by opening the bird the entire length with a cut along the ribs through the thin flesh between the back and the breast. The cut is continued to the pelvic bone and around the vent and the entire side is opened so the entrails can be removed easily.

After the legs and wings have been removed, the skin is opened from the wing opening toward the head and the windpipe, crop, and gullet are taken out. The shoulder blades come out easily if a cut is made across the back underneath them and they are broken off at the joint.

Remove the gall bladder from the liver without breaking it, and cut through the thick portion of the pizzard to remove the sack. The giblets are packed in a separate can to avoid darkening the other meat and changing its flavor.

To pack, place one thigh, one drumstick, two wings, and the neck and the ribs in the center of the can. Cover with the back and remaining pieces, add two teaspoonsful of salt, but no liquid. Put rubber jar rings in place and partially seal jar. If using tin cans, exhaust the air in cans by placing them in boiling water for seven minutes and then seal.

Salt the jars and place them in the pressure cooker, clamping the petcock open for seven minutes after the steam begins to escape. Then close the petcock and process for one hour at 15 pounds pressure. Tin cans may be cooled in cold water.

AMERICAN RECEIVES NOTED BRITISH AWARD

F. B. Jewett, Telephone Scientist, Is One of Two in This Country To Win Faraday Medal

Dr. Frank B. Jewett, Vice President of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and President of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Inc., has been awarded the Faraday Medal for 1935 by the Council of the Institution of Electrical Engineers, meeting in London. Dr. Jewett shares with Elhu Thomson the distinction of being the only representatives of the United States to receive this annual award since it was first given in 1922.

Among the other recipients have been Oliver Heaviside, Sir Charles Parsons, Dr. S. Z. D'Arsonval, Sir Joseph John Thomson, Col. Rookes, Evelyn Bell Compton, Sir J. A. Fleming, Guido Semenza, Lord Rutherford, Charles H. Merz, Sir Oliver Lodge, and Sir Frank E. Smith. The Faraday Medal award was instituted in 1922 in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the first meeting of the Society of Telegraph Engineers, which later became the Institution of Electrical Engineers. It is awarded "either for notable scientific achievement in electrical engineering, or for conspicuous services rendered to the advancement of electrical science, without restriction as regards nationality, country of residence or membership in the Institution."

An interesting experiment at a recent radio show was that of lighting an electric light bulb by passing wireless waves through a man's head. Such experiments should aid in determining the relative conductivity of solid ivory and in vacuum.

Dr. Grace in Familiar Pose—Demonstrating Marvels



The above photograph shows the late Dr. Sergius P. Grace as he was familiar to thousands throughout the country, demonstrating the wonders of science to an enthralled audience. The photograph was taken in Ann Arbor in February, 1929, when Dr. Grace returned to his own Alma Mater to lecture to the Fourth Michigan Engineering Conference. As the picture was taken, Dr. Grace was demonstrating one of his many amazing feats, "hearing without sound." The sound was transmitted with high voltage electricity through the wire held by Dr. Grace, then through his extended arm directly to the brain of the man in the center.

So greatly did Dr. Grace possess the ability, rare among scientists and inventors, of making complicated scientific matters clear and understandable to the layman, that he was constantly in demand in all parts of the country, and was able to accept only a small portion of the lecture invitations extended to him.

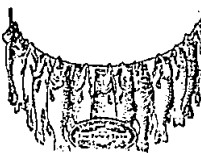

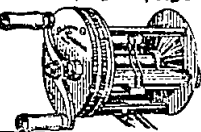
