RARE SPECIMEN OF STURGEON FOUND KILLED

A six-foot sturgeon which migrated up the Ausable river last spring to spawn, will not be returning to the waters of Lake Huron again this summer.

Victim of an unknown killer, the big fish was found hidden in the brush near Foot dam, 10 miles from the mouth of the stream. Its head had been gashed by a pike pole or a bullet.

The sturgeon, representative of a diminishing species of fresh-water fishes, attracted many visitors to Foot dam while it was attempting to spawn. Conservation officers recovered the carcass from the brush at the water's edge and buried it. The fish was estimated to weigh 110 pounds.

Sturgeon are protected by law the year around in Michigan. The killing of a sturgeon may be punished in justice court by heavy penalties.

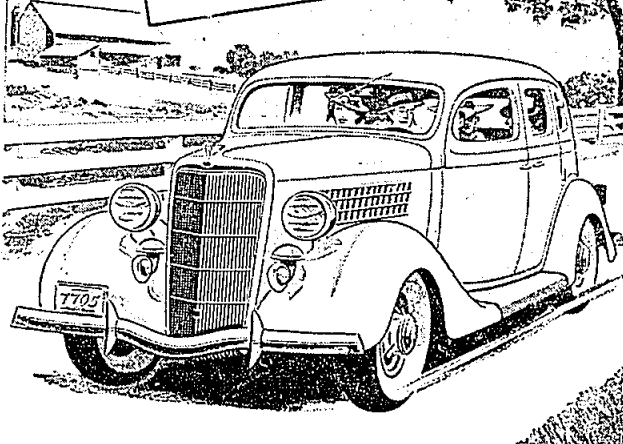

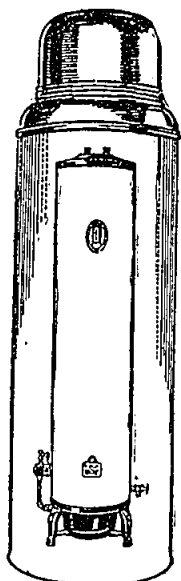
