The second largest bell in the world, and the largest in actual use, is said to be the one that hangs in the cathedral at Moscow and which is estimated to weigh about 125 tons. It is rung twite a year. The "Great Bell of China," tin Peking, weish about 50 tons, and there is a bell in the monaster; at Chi-On, in Kindo, Japan, which is mild to weigh between 50 and 50 tons.


