BEAUTY HINTS

To apply your face powder, use a clean powder puff. Nothing stamps an otherwise lovely woman unclean more distinctly than her displaying a soiled powder puff. You cannot hope to have a beautiful skin if she uses a powder puff

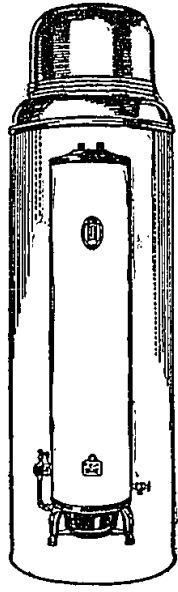
