## BEAUTY HINTS

Nothing gives a woman a more well groomed appearance than a clean, wellkept, head of hair. It makes no difference what shade the hair is because clean hair is always beautiful. With short hair it is very easy to keep it always looking its best.

Shampoo your hair at least twice a month, using one well beaten egg applied to the dry scalp. Wash in lukewarm, soft water. If hard water must be used, soften it with any water softener. Use pure soap which has been melted. Rinse well in lukewarm water. Dry in the sun if possible.

Much can be done for hair that has become thin. Look first to your general health and be sure that there is no underlying cause for falling hair. Keep the scalp clean; massage it; give it a warm oil shampoo once a month and brush it every day. Avoid wearing tight hats.

Try brushing your hair after it has been washed. Notice how the wave falls into place. Brushing removes excess curl lotion. Brush your hair each night, using fifty strokes on each side.

Belief in Witches

Belief in witchcraft persists even in London. A sect in the East and regularly brews "dragon's blood" to keep on good terms with witches.

Others seek to propitiate the "wise women" by hanging a string of rabbit's teeth above their doorways.

One little known London treasure house, the Cumming museum in the Walworth road, contains a display of witches' remedies, all collected from Londoners in the last few years.

A spirit shell, one horn, because of its apparently unending nature, guarantees a long life if carried in the pocket; a donkey's shoe covered with cloth and hitched to the bedpost drives away nightmares, while a pig's tooth hanging in a little tin around your neck is a sure guardian against fits.

Blood Mostly Water

Blood is 90 per cent water, liver 60 per cent; and bone, the most solid material in the body, contains 22 per cent of water. The rest of it is made up of lime, phosphate of magnesium, phosphate of calcium, calcium fluoride, and a fatty substance, collagen, which may be reduced to gelatin by boiling. If reduced scientifically to commercial products, the average body would produce one large dose of magnesia, about two pounds of sugar, enough fat to make several bars of soap, sufficient phosphorus for 3,000 matches, enough lime to wash a chicken house, and iron enough for two small nails.—Tit-Bits Magazine.

## Wolverine Reported Seen In Michigan

While residents along Lake Michigan are hearing stories of fabulous sea-serpents and strange marine animals, a "monster" of a different kind is occupying the attention of the upper peninsula.

It's a wolverine. At least, it appears like one say those who report having seen it.

Several residents north of the Straits have told of seeing the tracks of the mysterious animal or observing it in the woods during the past year. Every now and then it is reported in some different part of the country. The latest report comes from four lumbering men, Axel Anderson, John Hess and Ed and Swan Merila.

The men were fishing on the east branch of Fence river west of Republic where the strange animal made its most recent appearance. It boldly approached the entrance to their camp, it was said.

Students of natural history are becoming more interested in the reports from the upper peninsula and are wondering, how it happened to be in Michigan since the last wild members of its species were supposed to have disappeared from the state many years ago.
