Annual School Report

Annual meeting of the Board of Education of School District No. 9 held at the John Grace School Monday, July 1, 1935.

The following members answered the roll call, President L. J. Hamill, Secretary, Joseph W. Doe and Trustees Elmer Harlow and Otto Ealer. The treasurer H. Russell Perry being absent.

Meeting called to order at 8:45 o'clock p. m. with President L. J. Hamill in the chair.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Motion made by Mrs. Kallman and supported by Mrs. Ealer that the report as read by the secretary be accepted. Carried.

The treasurer's report showed receipts of \$10,125.24 and expenditures of \$10,108.26, leaving a balance on hand of \$16.98.

Motion by Elmer Harlow and supported by Mrs. Perry that tuition be paid for High School not to exceed \$80.00 per student. Carried.

Nominations were open for a trustee for a term of three years.

Mr. William Harrison was nominated by Mrs. Kallman and supported by Elmer Harlow.

Mr. Howard Kennedy was nominated by Mr. Ealer and supported by Mrs. Harlow.

Motion by Mrs. Ealer and supported by Mrs. Perry that the nomination close. Carried.

Mr. Glenn W. Levey was appointed teller.

Ballots were distributed and collected with the following results:

William Harrison 11
Howard Kennedy 7
William Harrison was declared elected for a term of 3 years.

Motion by William Harrison and supported by Mrs. Ealer that free text books be furnished pupils of the John Grace School, District No. 9. Carried.

Motion by Mrs. Kallman and supported by Howard Kennedy that the school officers' salaries remain the same. Motion lost.

After some discussion a motion was made by Mrs. Doe and supported by Mrs. Hamill that the officers' salaries be as follows:

Secretary, \$150.00 per year; President, \$50.00 per year; Treasurer, \$75.00 per year; and Trustees, \$37.50 each, per year. Motion carried the vote being 9 to 1 day.

Motion by Howard Kennedy and supported by Mrs. Doe that the length of the school term be left to the discretion of the school board. Carried.

Motion by Mrs. Hamill and supported by Mrs. Doe that we adjourn. Carried.

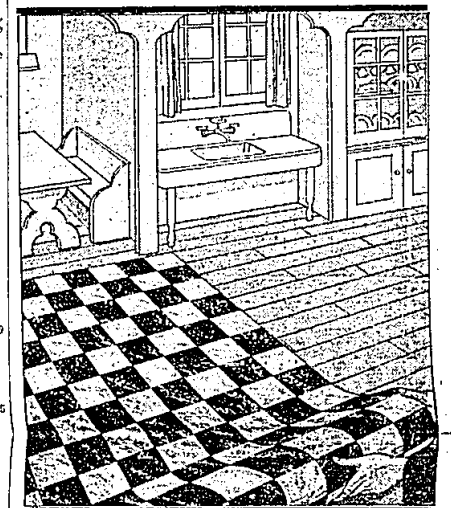
