Railroad Cooperation Reduces Fire Hazards

A new low record in the number A new low record in the number of railroad-caused forcest fires is predicted for 1935 in Michigan. To date this year railroads have been reaponable for only 31 forest fires, 50 under the all-time low record which was established in 1934. A total of approximately 100 acres has been burned over by these fires or a fraction over three acres per fire.

The steadily decreasing number of railroad-caused forest fires attests to the excellent cooperation. Michigan has been receiving in fire prevention from the railroads, states the Department of Conservation.

Railroads are ever on the alert for now devices and new methods to reduce the possibilities of fires caused by locomotives operating in forest areas. They have made unsalicited changes and improve-ments in a number of cases and al-together have shown an eagerness to cooperate in every way.

State Gets Royalties From 28 Oil Wells

Trom 28 Oil Wells

The State of Michigan now is deriving royaltica from 28 producing oil wells and two gas wells on attet lands leased for oil and gas. Approximately 78,000 acres of state-owned mineral rights are under lease.

Since March of the current year six producing wells have been completed on lands leased by the Department of Conservation in Churchill and Mills townships, acknowledged proven territory in Ogomaw county. The Initial production of the individual wells was reported at from 70 to 240 barrels after treatment.

Where wells are brought in on

reported at from 10 to 200 barries after treatment.

Where wells are brought in on wildcat lands the general fund of the state derives a one-eighth royalty on the net production. In proven territory, however, a slidingscale royalty basis becomes effective under which the state derives a proportionately increased revenue.

The Lands Division of the Department reports there is room for at least 20 more wells in Churchad and Millis townships on teased state lands on what is considered proven territory.

Radio To Be Employed In Forest Fire Fighting

The first attempt to bring any section of Michigan under radio communication as a weapon against forest fire is to be made by the Department of Conservation in the Mio district of the north-eastern part of the lower peninsula.

orsom B. Slocum of Okemos and Ralph O. Williams of East Lanslars, radio engineers of the Department, have been assigned to the Mio district to develop and perfect any radio equipment needed to equip the entire district.

The Mio disrict embraces four counties, Alcona, Oscoda, Oge-maw and Iosco.

FEW REQUESTS RECEIVED FOR WALK REPAIRS

With only three requests made by property owners in Farmington to have their walks repaired, Leo Glidemeister, comissioner of side-walks, has expressed the hope that more people will send in their pei-tions so that the work can be started before the beginning of cold weather.
