New Low Record  
In Forest Fires

With 12,021 acres of forest burned so far this year in comparison to 40,772 acres burned last year, the Conservation Department reports a new low record in the number of forest fires as well as the average burned acreage.

Up to the present time, there had a total of 1,354 fires with an average of less than 10 acres each burned over. The total estimated acreage burned is 12,021. Both of these totals for the period of the year they represent are the lowest on record in Michigan.

The fall months usually are a bugaboo to the state's fire organization, due to the dry grass and foliage as well as the large numbers of hunters in the woods, but with continued rainfall, it is expected these hazards will be greatly reduced.

The shells fired in the turret guns of our heavy cruisers weigh 30 pounds and are shot at a distance of about 38,000 yards, or 22 land miles.

## CCC Men To Plant Eight Million Trees

Michigan's fall reforestation program, involving the planting of 8,000,000 white, Norway and Jack-pine seedlings, will be conducted again without any item of labor cost to the state. CCC men from nearly a dozen different camps will do the work.

A total of 10,000 acres of state land, lying in the forest areas in the upper as well as the lower peninsula of the state, will be planted by CCC enrollees.

The plantings will be made as follows: Mackinac State forest, 1,200 acres; AuSable State Forest, 1,200 acres; Black Lake state forest, 1,200 acres; Hardwood State forest, 1,200 acres; Ogemaw state forest, 1,200 acres; Houghton Lake state forest, 1,200 acres; Huculus Lake state forest, 1,000 acres; Presque Isle and Fife Lake state forests, 1,200 acres, each.
