MICHIGAN LAKES YIELD 1,800 MILES OF FISH

If 16.3 fish were caught per acre during 1934 in Five Lake near Traverse City, how many fish were taken from all of the inland lakes of Michigan?

Just about 13,000,000 estimates the Institute for Fisheries Research of the Department of Conservation. And if half end-to-end they'd reach from Detroit to Spokane or from southeastern Michigan to Los Angeles, distances of approximately 1,800 miles.

In arriving at these figures, the Institute used several sources of information. From various data used it estimated that all of Michigan's inland lakes have an area totalling approximately 830,000 acres.

Through a census conducted by CCC men it learned early this year that Five Lake near Traverse City, which probably is more productive of fish than the average upper Michigan lake and less productive than the average lower Michigan lake, produced 16.3 fish per acre that year.

Assuming that the production of Five Lake is equal to the average production of Michigan's inland lakes and that the estimate on total acreage is now correct, the Institute calculated that the inland lakes of Michigan produced about 13,500,000 fish during the year.

It also estimated that the average fisherman took approximately 27 fish during the year.
