Favored National University

Washington was greatly interested in the establishment of a national university and referred to it in his first message to congress in 1790. In his will he gave 50 shares in the Potomac company, worth at that time about \$25,000, the endowment of such an institution, provided congress should incline to extend a fostering hand toward it. Congress has never done this, though urged to do so by Madison, John Quincy Adams and other statesmen, and numerous bills for establishing such an institution have been introduced. There has been a question of its constitutionality and also as to the desirability of the federal government's controlling educational agencies through such a university. The 50 shares left by Washington were undoubtedly turned back to his estate.

The upper parts of the Meadowlark are light brown, streaked with brownish black. The head has a dull, grayish, straw-colored patch with streaks of brownish black. The sides of the head are grayish white. The throat, breast and belly are bright yellow, fading into gray white beneath the tail. The black markings on the upper breast are very showy. The outer tail feathers are white. The hind wings are brown with small, blackish spots. The upper, forward curve of the wing is lined with a light ashy

color.

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Powerful Hoses Help Suppress Forest Fires

Water pumped from the ground at the rate of 65 gallons a minute and projected in powerful 100-foot streams, is aiding Michigan's fire force in the upper peninsula in its suppression work.

A jet-well rig, capable of sinking a shallow well and producing water under pressure within 10 minutes' time, has been located permanently at Newberry to combat forest fires in Schoolcraft and Lake counties and the east half of Alger county.

The rig is mobile and effective in utilizing ground water supplies wherever the ground water table is 20 feet or less below the surface of the ground.

Similar rigs eventually will be at located to the Baraga and Trout lake districts of the upper peninsula.

Data To Be Sought On Drivers' Cards

Owners of automobiles, who apply for 1935 license plates, will be asked one question on the application blank which has never been asked in previous years. The question will be "When does your operator's license expire?"

The decision to embody this question on the application blanks for 1935 license plates has been made by Louis H. Morony, Director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department of State. The decision was endorsed by the executive committee of the Michigan Safety and Traffic Director's Association, meeting recently in the East Lansing headquarters of the Michigan State Police.

The original proposal included recommendations that the giving of this information be made a condition of the issuance of the plate; Morony, however, chose to include the question merely as a device for reminding owners and operators that their operators' licenses have expiration dates on them.

Under the 1931 Michigan license act of 1931, applicants for licenses will be asked to give this information merely as a matter of cooperation with the department.

With some 200,000 operators or cars being licensed today, the expectation is that the majority of them, being forgetful rather than intentionally unlicensed, will thus be reminded of their delinquency.

It is believed that virtually no one will have the temerity to ask for a license plate while actually skirting his name to a statement that his operator's license has expired.
