FOOD AND DRUGS ACT ABIDED BY IN MICHIGAN

Michigan shippers of fruits and vegetables apparently are observing the requirements of the Federal Food and Drugs Act, as a latest report of enforcement officers does not contain any report of Michigan violations.

Fruit, vegetables, canned goods, butter, fruit juices, drugs, and medicinal preparations are all checked closely to find if they conform to federal regulations. Fruit and vegetables may have too great an amount of spray residue. Canned goods may be of inferior quality or may be labeled as a grade higher than they actually are.

Inspectors are watching the markets at all times and have power to seize and condemn any goods which do not meet requirements. Actions at law may be started against violators and stiff penalties given in federal courts.

The need for such supervision is easily proved by looking at the records on products which have been seized. The latest list cites court actions on incorrect labeling of canned products, ginger ale containing undeclared caffeine, butter deficient in butterfat, short weights in canned fruit, drugs below certain standards, stock tonics sold under fraudulent claims, and patent medicines labeled as cures for diseases when they actually had no curative properties.

Some of the claims made for these medicines seem humorous to healthy people, but they are sold to persons suffering from incurable diseases or who are living in sections where it is difficult to get medical care. Most of the sales are made to men or women who can not afford to pay any money for these worthless compounds.

CAPITAL LEADS IN TELEPHONE RATIO

Washington Oinks the World
on a Basis of Telephones in
Proportion to Population

Washington, D. C., takes first place among all cities in telephone ratio, the ratio being the number of telephones in proportion to population. In other large cities, not only in the United States but in the world, according to the most recent statistics available, San Francisco, California, holds this honor, in the second place, but by a scant vote.

Washington has 31 telephones for each 100 of population. San Francisco has a percentage of 28.00, and Stockholm, Sweden, is in third place with 21.35, except for Stockholm, and Vancouver, B. C., which holds fifth place. Large foreign cities have a higher telephone development than the United States. There are 63 cities or telephone exchange areas in the United States with more than 200,000 inhabitants, and in these there is an average of more than 19 telephones per 100 of population. The superiority of American telephone development is indicated when this figure is contrasted with a telephone development of some of the principal capital cities of the world.

In absolute number of telephones the United States cities are far ahead of foreign cities. New York City has nearly as many telephones as Berlin, London and Paris combined and actually more telephones than the entire continent of Asia. Chicago has more telephones than all of South and Central America. Los Angeles has more than the entire continent of Africa.

How Fish Breathe
Fishes breathe by means of gills, which represent the greatest departure in adaptation. These animals to an aquatic environment. Lifting the operculum, the fish draws over the gills, four pairs of flat, finger-like bodies are exposed, and the flow of the throat just behind the operculum is increased. The gill arches, each of which bears two gill processes. Being highly supplied with blood, the gills offer surface for gas exchange, oxygen dissolved in water, being taken in and distributed over the body, while the blood, relieved of its carbonic acid gas charge, passes directly into the water.

VILLAGE REJOICES IN GIFT OF TELEPHONE

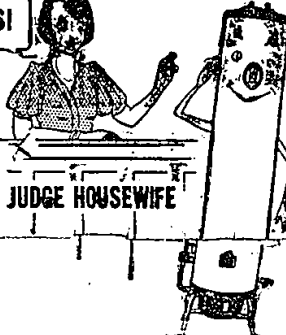
Priest Blesses Instruments as
Service Is Opened Between
Madrid, Viena, in Spain

The Spanish government recently made an unusual present to the village of Vico, on the southern slopes of the Pyrenees. As a result, there is great rejoicing in that section. For the gift of the Spanish government consisted of telephone service, and to reach the village the engineers had to take the telephone line through deep passes and over snow-covered hills.

The New York Times, in describing the event, said: "On the morning of the great day, the priest, townspeople and the school children formed a solemn procession, headed by the mayor and the priest in their most gorgeous robes. They marched through the snow to the central exchange, and the privileged few for whom there was room saw the priest shake the holy water over instruments and switchboard and bless them all in sonorous Latin phrases. After that there was feasting and dancing. Men went and embraced each other on the streets, all because they could talk into one end of a black instrument in Madrid and hear the voice of the city through the other."

More than 2,300 ringnecked pheasants, reared at the state game farm near Mason, have been released by the Department of Conservation in 23 lower Michigan counties, so far this summer.
