**Most Famous Assassination**  
Paradoxically the tablet which marks the spot of the world's most famous assassination—that of Archduke Francis Ferdinand in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia—contains only the name of the murderer. The inscription is: "On this Historic Spot Gavrillo Princip on St. Vitus' day, June 28, 1914, Performed the Deed of Liberty." J. C. Donavan, Buffalo, N. Y., in Collier's Weekly.

**Botanic Gardens**  
The million-dollar United States Botanic garden, west of the Capitol in Washington, is said to have the most varied and widely collected specimens of plants and flowers in the world. Ninety-six tons of aluminum and 200 tons of structural steel make this conservatory, with its palm house, subterranean border houses, promenades and 70-foot cascade, rank as one of the finest in the world.

**Quaint Clockwork Mennequins**  
Every noon of the year in Rothenburg, Germany, two windows high in the dripping hall open, and two clockwork figures reenact the historic "master drink." A general watches from one, while in the other an old-fashioned burgoon smokes a huge goblet and tilting back his head slowly empties the cup. It was this huge draught which saved the heads of the city councilors in 1531, when Commandant Thilly took the city. He had sentenced the council to death, but mellowed by a few drinks, he agreed to spare them if one could drain in a single draught a three-quart goblet. An ex-burgomaster did, though he fell in a swoon afterward.

**Meaning of "Black Law"**  
"Black law" was a name applied to any one of a series of laws, passed in various border and northern states before the Civil war, sharply discriminating against free negroes who wished to emigrate to such states and become citizens thereof. Thus, in some states, certificates of freedom were to be filed. Negroes were to be excluded from the militia and no negro was to testify in cases in which any white man was directly interested.

**Iron Wood**  
We usually think of wood as a rather soft substance, easily chopped or sawed, yet a new with teeth hard enough to cut glass was found necessary in order to cut samples of wood received from the Brazilian jungles by the forestry department of Syracuse university. Brought out of the Amazon jungle on the backs of Indians and thence by canoe to a point where they could be shipped to Syracuse, the specimens are largely of iron-wood trees—Washington Post.

**The Balkans**  
The Balkans are a series of ridges of mountains in southeastern Europe. The term Balkan peninsula is applied to the region which contains them, the peninsula of southeastern Europe which was formerly under Turkish suzerainty, except that Rumania and Greece are often omitted in naming the Balkan states. The others, now, are Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Albania and the remnant of European Turkey.

## "TOBACCO ROAD" OPENS SEASON AT CASS THEATRE

"Tobacco Road," a brilliant comedienne in one of the dark unkept corners of American life, which the critics united in naming as the outstanding American stage play of the decade, will begin a limited engagement at the Cass theatre, Detroit, on Sunday night, October 12, with matinees on Wednesday and Saturday.

It is a sociological and pathological document and as near to Zolaesque realism in writing, staging and acting as has ever been seen or is likely to be seen in the American theatre. Four different actors have played the leading roles successfully, their interpretations of the character of Jester somewhat differing, but all apparently more than acceptable. All have their champions but all appear to extract from the role the same hearty laughs.

The action of the play takes place at the farm of Jester Lester situated on a Tobacco road in the back country of Georgia. Old Jester around whom the play more or less revolves, is a bad lot. He is cognizant of no moral law but the satisfaction of his appetites. He is shiftless and living with the ruthless instincts of a beast of prey, but has within an underlying vein of comedy.

The characters of "Tobacco Road" enjoy a complete suspension of moral belief. A buxom female reveller, sister Bessie, gets young Duke Lester the half-wit son, to marry her in exchange for an automobile. Jester's morning bath scene and his awakening from his nap has not been surpassed for humor since Jester's famous monologue performance of Rip Van Winkle.

James Kirkwood's performance of Jester Lester, with its rich earthy fun has been acclaimed as one of the master pieces of character acting of the American stage.

The distinguished cast which comprises Mr. Kirkwood, Misses Maude Lambert, Florence Gerald, Lillian Ardell, Cynthia Arlen, Elaine Ellis, Robert Ross, Thelma Davis, Marshall Hall, Donna Bennett, Walter Ayres and Jean Benini.
