ETHIOPIA TO BE DISCUSSED IN ADVENTURE SERIES

As war flares in the mountain fastnesses of Ethiopia, the World Adventure Series announces that it will present Alfred M. Bailey, noted explorer and director of the Chicago Academy of Sciences, in his lecture with motion pictures "By Caravan 2,000 Miles through Ethiopia" Sunday, October 20, at 8:30 p. m. at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

At 3:30 p. m. on the same Sunday, Upton Close, America's foremost authority on the Orient will tell about and show motion pictures of his two decades of high adventure in "Pacific Asia from Korea to the Malay Peninsula." Upton Close was advisor to the Student Revolution, served on the staff of Dictator Du Pei-fu, fought with a Chinese army, acted as war correspondent for the New York Times, was eyewitness reporter for the League of Nations during the Japanese invasion of Manchuria.

In the evening, Mr. Bailey will tell how he traveled muleback 2,000 miles through the length and breadth of Ethiopia. He lived, fought and played with the fierce warrior-tribesmen and their semi-savage chieftains. Among the same walled gorges and jagged peaks through which the Italian legions are not battering their way, Bailey hunted the walla leeb, the lion, the leopard and the baboon. His motion pictures show the obstacles that the country offers to white men and its rich natural resources that lure Mussolini's Fascists.

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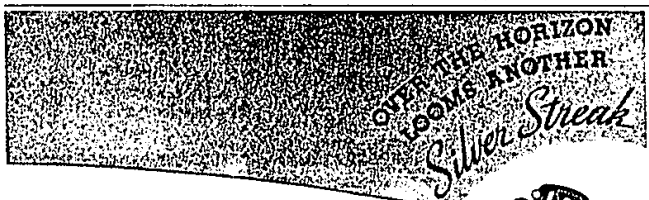
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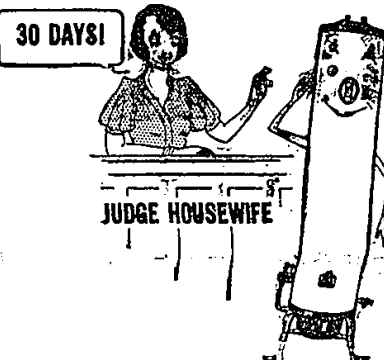
