WORK NEARING COMPLETION ON LOG CABIN

What has been heretofore a mystery for many people is gradually being unfolded as the spasmodic efforts on the part of its owner and his helpers are bringing the log cabin at Farmington road and the Cutoff nearer completion.

Little has been known about the structure since it was begun several months ago. A few men would work vigorously on it for a week or so at a time. Then they would give up as though in despair and nothing would be seen of them for several days when they would return and begin anew. The mystery deepened when nothing seemed to happen in the way of progress.

Then, suddenly, as though the builders had been working with magical hammers in the night, several dozen of logs were added and window frames set in.
