## WOMAN DISCOVERS PLACE FOR FAIR SEX IN WORLD

Just to prove that women have a place in the world other than their duties in the home, the visit of Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor, to Michigan State College is division.

Frances Perkins is the first woman ever to hold a cabinet position and she has not secured the eminence of a sacrifice of a normal life. She is married and has one daughter. The Secretary of Labor first became interested in labor problems through her association with Jane Adams at Hull House in Chicago.

In business life the Secretary retains her maiden name and is referred to as Miss Frances Perkins. She told at East Lansing of her first visit to Lansing when she presided over a conference on labor legislation. Included in this program were measures regarding the hours of work, minimum wages, workmen's compensation, safety and health measures, which have since been enacted laws.

Miss Perkins asked for close cooperation between federal and state officials so that the benefits of social legislation will have the greatest possible applications. The need to secure these benefits for the needy aged, dependent and crippled children, widowed mothers and indigent disabled and blind people was stressed by the Secretary.

Miss Perkins said, "Building up reserves in good times through the application of unemployment insurance will help sustain purchasing power in bad times and will permit us to grow old without being haunted by the spectre of a poverty ridden old age or of being a burden to our children."

## STATE OFFICIAL ANSWERS PEOPLE'S MANY QUESTIONS

Members of Congress are asked many questions pertaining to the federal government and procedure in Congress. Congressman George A. Dondero, who represents the 17th Michigan district, this article supplies the answers to the most frequent queries about the organization of Congress.

The Congress of the United States is made up of two houses, the Senate and the House of Representatives, the former corresponding to the House of Lords and the latter to the House of Commons in the English government. There are 96 Senators, two from each state, and elected for terms of six years. Thirty-two are elected at each biennial election. There are 435 members of the House of Representatives, each representing a district with boundaries determined by population. Michigan is divided into 17 districts. The 17th Michigan district includes all of Oakland county, the 22nd ward in the city of Detroit, and the townships of Redford, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth in Wayne county, and has a population of approximately 318,000. The entire membership of the House is subject to election biennially.

While members of either house of Congress are properly designated Congressmen, it has become the custom to refer to members of the upper house as Senators and to those of the lower house as Congressmen.

Members of the House of Representatives are further identified by "Mr. C." (Member of Congress) following their names; this corresponding to "Mr. P." (Member of Parliament) following names of members of the House of Commons.

Each Congress is consecutively numbered and is of two years' duration with a regular session each year. The 1935 session was designated as the first session of the 74th Congress; and the 1936 session will be known as the second session of the 74th Congress. Regular sessions convene on the third day of January of each year and adjourn in December. Under the House system a Congressman began his term on the fourth day of March following the November election but did not participate in a session of Congress until the second day of December following his election.

The short session soon became known as the "lame duck" session for the reason that generally many of the legislators attending had been defeated in the November election and would leave office the following March.

Before taking up his duties each Congressman takes an oath, as follows: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter. So help me God."

Congress accomplishes most of its legislative work through committees. The Senate has 23 standing committees and the House of Representatives has 47. These standing committees meet regularly on call of the chairman and consider such bills as are referred for report.

The Vice President of the United States presides over the Senate. The House of Representatives elects its presiding officer, who is officially designated as Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each party nominates its candidate for Speaker and the one receiving the majority of votes is declared elected. The present Speaker is the Honorable Joseph W. Byrns of Tennessee.

Congressman Dondero will later discuss the different methods of voting, the passage of bills, and other interesting features of procedure in the House of Representatives.

### Seven Die in Three Weeks of Hunting

Seven dead and fifteen injured was the toll of hunting accidents during the first three weeks of October in Michigan.

Four of the hunting fatalities occurred during the first week of upland hunting season in the lower peninsula; three deaths occurred in the upper peninsula where the upland small game season opened October 1.

Up to October 21, a total of 15 hunters had been reported injured, three of them receiving crippling injuries. One hunter lost three fingers; another was shot through the arm and a third through the leg.

## Mexican Mosaic

"THE day we arrived in Santa Maria del Azul it certainly looked peaceful enough. Peacocks and hot and dusty; a place where people dozed when they weren't sleeping and nothing at all ever happened. That was my first impression and I kept it for two weeks. Which merely goes to show that you don't always have to be right to be a writer."

Santa Maria del Azul—plain Maria to us and to you—is down in the heart of Oaxaca, Mexico; but don't look on your wall map for it. There are 40 houses and 300 people and the mission. It had never seen anything on wheels except an ox cart until our caravan trailed in.

We came to Maria—34 of us—to film scenery. We had a script of "Senor Diablo" and we chose it chiefly because of the mission. They say there isn't an older Christian edifice in all Mexico; assuredly there is none more picturesque. It is a massive altar, topped by a wondrous golden statuette of the Christ child in Maria's dearest pride and joy. And that's just what brought about the trouble.

On an April Sunday morning we rolled into the village, tired, thirsty and fed up with travel. Val Norris had written ahead for accommodations. The place was still as death and apparently deserted. We lay around for 20 minutes, too weary and dispirited to do more than grumble. At last Val reappeared coming, armed us with that brisk stride of his which just then seemed peculiarly offensive.

"Everything's fine," he chirruped; "they're all in church, but we've fixed up three of their best houses for us. Come on and have a look." The domes weren't bad, everything considered. Neither was the comely young señora who showed us around, delighting shyly in her careful English. But best of all was Conchita.

Largely deaf and silent and vainly attempting to hold her mother's skirt and smilled with elfin gravity on those of us who spoke to her in Spanish. Then Leonora Brett picked her up, saying: "Hello, there! Do you like our pictures?" and an instant friendship was born.

All through the following week she was with us each day. Every piece of our equipment fascinated her, but she found the greatest pleasure in playing with a camera dolly.

The camera crew achieved some really fine lighting effects on the altar and its magnificent little statue. For half an hour the cameras whirled steadily; then Val Norris said: "That's enough; let's call it a day."

I suddenly felt a touch of regret for I knew it was the end. Tomorrow we would pack up and begin the long jaunt back to California. As I started to leave the mission Val took my arm, saying: "Come on outside; I want to show you something."

We went into the little yard behind the church. There stood a contraption I didn't immediately recognize.

"It's that camera dolly Chronotax's been so crazy about," Norris explained. "It has film but slides and a handle on it and paint it red. Ought to make a fair imitation of a wagon, don't you think? Let's find the kid and give it to her."

Just two hours later I was cramming clothes into my suitcase when shouts reached me from the street. I stepped to a window and saw a crowd of men, the priest at their head, running toward the house. The next instant they were swarming up the front path. The young cleric burst in and faced me.

"Senor, it has been taken," he cried; "the figure of our blessed Savior is gone!"

Suddenly Val Norris strode out of his room behind me, an automatic pistol in each hand.

"What the hell is this?" he demanded, but the renewed shouts of the mob drowned him out. He had made the worst possible error in appearing armed. Now they were certain of our guilt, determined upon swift and violent vengeance. They began to press forward, to surge up the steps. Norris swore hoarsely and fired once. The noise set Mexican reels backward, clutching at his shoulder.

All at once an excited cry cut through. A man was pointing down the road. There, fifty yards away, Leonora Brett came running. In her arms was Conchita, behind them clattered the new red homemade wagon, and on that sat the golden statuette of the Christ child.

## FARMINGTON NEEDS MORE RED CROSS VOLUNTEERS

The Farmington Red Cross campaign will close November 23, but more volunteers are needed, according to Mrs. John J.
