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KREISLER TO BE HEARD DEC. 3 AT ANN ARBOR

Two important concerts will be given by the University Musical Society in Hill Auditorium, Ann Arbor, during the month of December.

Fritz Kreisler, the eminent violinist, will be heard for the ninth time in the Choral Union Series on December 3, and the Boston Symphony Orchestra, led by Serge Koussevitzky, will make its eleventh Ann Arbor appearance on December 11.

Both concerts promise to attract many out-of-town and out-of-state visitors, as well as local concertgoers. The advance demand for tickets has been unusually large, indicating that these attractions with the passage of years, grow in attractiveness.

Kreisler was first heard in Ann Arbor in 1920, and has been called back repeatedly during the past 35 years.

Following the holiday season, the second half of the Choral Union Series will include performances by the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra under Vladimir Golitschman; the Detroit Symphony Orchestra with Bernardino Molinari as guest conductor; the Kolisch String Quartet; recitals by John Charles Thomas, baritone, and Myra Hess, pianist.

CHEVROLET DEALER DOUBLES EARLY NOVEMBER SALES

Countrywide sales by Chevrolet dealers for the first 10 days of November totaled 32,657 units, nearly double the highest total for the same period in previous years. It was announced by Chevrolet Motor Co. The total reflects the results of the early introduction of 1936 models and the change of date of the automobile show season, says the announcement.

The total of 32,657 not only exceeds the record of any previous corresponding period, but sets a new high mark for 10-day sales following the introduction date of any previous new models. It was said.

"It is apparent that the early presentation of new models, and the holding of the automobile show in November instead of January, has had an important effect on car sales," said W. E. Haller, vice president and general sales manager, who announced the new records. "This first ten-day period of November included one day on which the new Chevrolets were not on sale, since they were not shown to the public till November 2, yet its sales exceed the total 30-day November sales of all but four years in the history of the company. Our largest November record was in 1926, and the sales in the first ten days of that month were 17,678 units, only slightly more than half of the new record just established."

CHICAGO MARKET DETERMINES STATE MILK PRICES

During the past year and sometime previous to that, all milk produced by the state farmers for field milk market not needed in the daily sales, has been paid for according to the Chicago butter market. Up to the present time, 42 per cent of the milk shipped by the nearly 14,000 producers of the Michigan Milk Producers' association, in the Detroit market, is in class II and III. The price for this milk is determined by the Chicago butter market plus certain percentages. Chicago 92-score butter last month averaged 25.4 cents per pound, which is half cent per pound higher than a year ago.

Up to October 1 butter production decreased 24,879,000 pounds compared with that same period a year ago. This is no doubt due to there being less dairy cows on farms this year, compared with a year ago, even though pasture conditions have been considerably improved this year.

The cold storage holding this year are 23,000 pounds larger than a year ago. During this same period 21,525,263 pounds of butter has been imported into this country, while only 500,881 pounds was exported.

If butter had no substitute there would be no extra butter at the present time. Since January 1st, 248,046,577 pounds of oleo were manufactured. This shows an increase of 57,107,311 pounds of oleo manufactured compared with the same period of a year ago.

Doctors Gain in Fight Against Tuberculosis

New emphasis has been placed by the Michigan Tuberculosis association on the need for the careful examination of tuberculosis contacts, following discovery of four active cases in a recent survey of 125 persons who had been exposed to the disease. Besides the four adult type cases found, two were suspected of having the active disease and 32 were declared to have the childhood type of tuberculosis.

Declaring that the survey pointed to the way to new progress in the fight against tuberculosis, Dr. Bruce H. Douglas, president of the association, announced that additional contact clinics were being planned.

"While the results of one survey can lead us to no definite conclusions or to the establishment of any permanent policy," Dr. Douglas explained, "we do feel that our findings warrant further work in that direction."

"The fact that out of 125 persons who have been in close touch with a case of tuberculosis, 32 were found to have the disease shows very definitely the need for special attention to these groups. While it is true that only four of the dangerous adult type cases were found, it is also true that these four already may have infected others. We have found four sources of the disease and that, in itself, is worth the whole effort."

"As for those who were found to have the childhood type tuberculosis, while living on their parts will prevent the development of the active disease, they have put on their guards."
