Household Hints

After the porcelain sink has been thoroughly washed and allowed to dry stains can be removed by sprinkling generously with cream of tartar and allowing it to stand for several hours.

A teaspoon of salt to each gallon of water used in washing and rinsing colored materials will usually prevent fading and running.

To be sure apples keep their color while cooking first place them in cold water to which a little lemon juice has been added.

A little bluing added to the soap suds in which cut glass dishes are washed will make them sparkle.

When the paraffin used for sealing your jellies begins to harden place a short piece of string in each jar to serve as a handle to remove the paraffin when you want to open the jars.

Drying ferns can sometimes be revived by placing a tablespoon of Castor oil around the roots.

Don't pack your chicken or fish dressings in too tightly because they expand considerably while baking.

AMERICANS GROW MORE APPLES THAN IN PAST

If there is any truth in the old adage that an apple a day keeps the doctor away, Americans this year can have an ample supply of disease preventatives about their homes in the form of juicy apples.

The U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics has estimated that this year's crop has amounted to more than 96 million bushels. This is approximately 20 million bushels more than American fruit growers produced last year.

The largest apple harvest between the two coasts has been in western Michigan where the municipal cash-to-grower Benton Harbor fruit market is located. One percent of the nation's entire apple supply last year was sold there by Michigan farmers to fruit operators and truckmen from half the states. Part of that supply found its way into Farmington homes.

In 1934 Michigan produced 4,224,000 bushels of apples, but this year there were 5,600,000 bushels available.

Each apple producing area has those varieties that it can produce better than others. The cool climate and soil types of Michigan make the state especially adapted for the production of such dessert apples as Jonathan, Northern Spy, and Delicious. Utility apples that prove especially popular with the housewives include the Greenings, Baldwins, Wagners, Kings and many others.
