## MICHIGAN PRESS SUPPORTS STATE SAFETY CAMPAIGN

The Michigan Press, recognizing the critical aspects of the traffic situation, has thrown its full weight behind the year-round safety educational campaign being directed by the State Safety Council. As one, editors call for the elimination of favoritism and sentimentality from enforcement, urge more discrimination in the issuance of drivers' licenses, recommend the necessity for solving the correlated problem of how to stop pedestrians from committing suicide by realizing the dangers of jay-walking, barging out against red lights, and other hazardous habits.

Bitterly critical, the editor of one newspaper says: "At present, any novice, fool, crank or booze fighter can get a license in Michigan."

Traffic surveys are now in progress in Detroit and Lansing. Battle Creek is in the midst of an intensive campaign in which 5,000 copies of "Sudden Death" have been distributed, store windows placarded and wrecked cars exhibited in the downtown streets have opened the public's eyes to the potential havoc which may be wrought by collision.

Many newspapers are not only supporting individual campaigns in their own localities but have persuaded a large majority of their advertisers to back the state campaign by using safety propaganda in the space the advertisers ordinarily use for retail copy.

## Radio Aids in Capture Of Game-Law Violators

Short-wave radio sets are making Michigan's northwoods unsafe for the game-law violator.

Messages flashed by state troopers and Conservation Officers from the jackpine and spruce swamps of the Ogema State forest, 80 miles northwest of Bay City, led to the arrest of three out-of-state men who were hunting on resident licenses.

Clerks at Conservation Posts in Atlanta, Mo and Gladwin kept tuned in on the radio sets and on information received over the air definitely established the residence of hunters living in Indiana and Illinois.

The suspicion of the officers was first aroused by the presence of out-of-state license plates on the hunters' cars. Using the license numbers as a lead, the officers ascertained by long-distance telephone communication the names of each individual and his place of residence.

Convictions were obtained in three cases and heavy fines assessed.

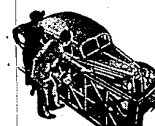
