The ordinance originally forbade the sale of any alcoholic líquors for consumption on the premises on Sunday. The com-mission, however, threw out that section.

section. Another important provision of the act, as pointed out at Monday's meeting, is section eight, it forbids the obstruction of view from the street. No curtains, drapes or shades are to extend more than 42 inches from the floor, and no par-titions are permitted.
