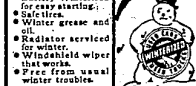

FARMINGTON FLOWERS TO LIVE IN A NEW HOUSE

The building boom days of the prosperity era have not returned, and building "ain't what it used to be," in the yearning of the street, but Farmington continues to spread out here and there at times. One of the latest accomplishments in the building line is the new addition at the Spring Brook Gardens.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Hickling started their "year around" greenhouse with one unit in November 1934. Recently a 30 by 50 foot addition with a "lean-to" was completed. They now have 3600 square feet of glass.

Spring Brook Gardens is located on a well-known plot of ground. It has been in the family of Mrs. Bickling since 1868. In its early days the place was open ground, as Spring Brook Farm, and the Bicklings state that they had little difficulty in naming their floral gardens when they opened it.

Despite the fact that hundreds of acres are raised by the florists, their object is to specialize in cut flowers for all occasions and to have cut flowers the year around. Potted plants also come in for special attention.

In the coming months the Bicklings hope to invest in special floral cloth. The advantage in using the cloth covering is that flowers are generally in full bloom two weeks ahead of their season, and it increases the quality of the flowers, giving them longer stems and larger petals.

The Bicklings formerly were "summer time" florists, with only their six acres of open ground. In 1934 they built their first unit, and with that they entered the "year around" floral class.

Mrs. Bickling started in the floral business as a hobby, and after several years she turned it into an avocation. Her husband became associated with her in the floral business in 1934. Mrs. Bickling has studied the "ins" and "outs" of flowers and designs.

Her most interesting study was accomplished during the month that she studied at an exclusive floral shop in Grosse Pointe.
