Hull Endorses Detroit World Trade Day

Hon. Cordell Hull, Secretary of State at Washington, D. C. today granted official sanction and expressed best wishes for the success of the World Trade Conference and Official Diplomatic Banquet and Ball to be held in Detroit Tuesday, March 10th, in connection with the Second Annual Detroit and Michigan Exposition, March 6th to 15th inclusive, according to Harry M. Robins, chairman.

Elaborate plans are being developed, declared Robins. Formal invitations are being transmitted through State Department channels to official trade representatives of 55 foreign nations.

SENATOR NYE TO SPEAK ON "ARMS RACKET"

U. S. Senator Gerald P. Nye (R), from North Dakota, who is chairman of the Senate Munitions Investigating Committee, will speak before the Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, January 29, at 11 o'clock. Senator Nye will speak on "The Munitions Racket."

The temperate Senator Nye's current investigating has stirred up both in the Senate and throughout the country, is nothing unusual for the crusading 43-year-old orator from the wheatlands. He was chairman of the Senate Public Lands Committee which investigated the Continental Trading Company's relation to the Terpel Dome oil scandal. The question he and the late Thomas Walsh asked helped to return to the United States Treasury, in back taxes and penalties, oil concessions and other stolen goods, enough to finance any number of investigations.

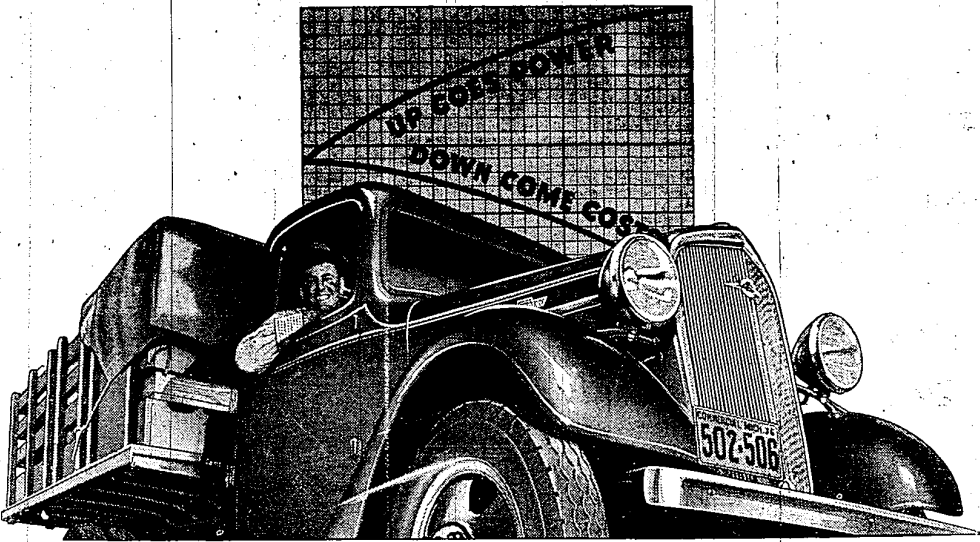

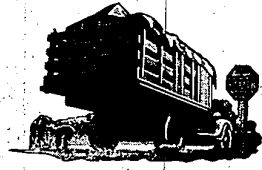
