Political and economic progress in Russia and addresses of a big game hunter in Africa make up the lecture offerings at the Institute of Arts this coming week-end.

Having toured Russia only last summer, Mr. Bryan's information is authentic and up-to-date. The following evening, Sunday, at 8:30, Mr. Bryan will lecture on "Russia—Japan—Manchukuo." Both lectures are new and both will be generously illustrated with new motion pictures never before shown in Detroit.

Sunday afternoon at 3:30, Captain C. W. R. Knight, explorer, will lecture on "Monarchs of the African Veldt." He will show his thrilling motion pictures taken on his tour of Africa last summer. Captain Knight has also agreed to exhibit one of his live, trained eagles.

Following all three of these lectures, the meeting will be open to questions from the audience.

The World Adventure Series, the civic, non-profit organization that sponsors these lectures, announces that almost fifty thousand persons have attended the Sunday lectures so far this season.

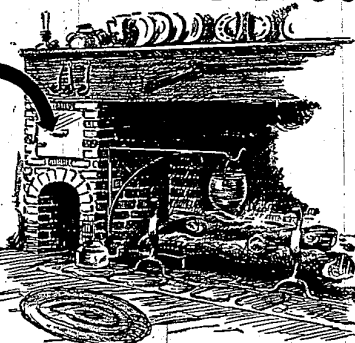
