#### RAPID GAIN BOOKKEEPING

One thousand three hundred eighty-six Michigan farmers in 60 counties turned bookkeeper in 1935, to keep a complete financial record of their farm business. The work will be carried on in 65 coun ties in 1936.

The financial record project is a part of the Farm Management Department extension service of Michigan State College, and was attared in 1292 in 33 counties. In this work the farmers keep financial records of their farm operations, together with such additional information as is necessary for a detailed analysis of their business. Every farmer enrolled as a project cooperator is visited on his farm during the summer by the local county agricultural agent and a representative of the Farm Management Department of the college. 
