Oakland County "Show Place" Destroyed by Fire

From a historical standpoint, the fire that razed the spacious farm home of Mr. and Mrs. John McCullough, on Halstead road, Monday, brought to an end the existence of one of the national real-estate gems of rural Oakland County. The "show place," built by Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Sprague in 1875, was unusual in its architecture. It was of red brick, stately in size and proportions, with a mansard roof, topped with delicately patterned iron grill work. The architect was J. S. Prall, who was also builder of the Farmington Town Hall. An Oakland County history, published in 1877 included a full page sketch of the property with portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Sprague. The home, valued at approximately \$15,000, was completely destroyed along with all the furnishings. Only recently some \$9,000 had been spent by the McCulloughs in completely remodeling the home and improving the grounds. Farmington and Northville firemen, working in 12 below zero weather, were unable to save the structure. The McCulloughs had sought and occupied the property in August, 1935.

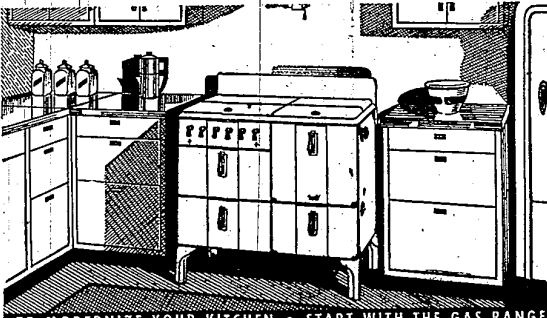
