A snack bar will be open for the entire day, under the di-

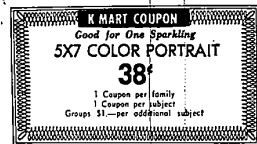
rection of Betty Clark and Edna Siler.

Contract negotiators representing Farmington School District's 700 teachers have been named by the Farmington Education Association.

Negotiators representing the Farmington District School Board have not been named, according to Marlin Van-Ameyde, assistant superintendent of Farmington schools, who headed the 1965 administration team.

The present yearly master contract expires Aug. 31, 1969, and calls for negotiations to be underway by March 1, if either the administration or the teachers request it.

The 1967-68 master contract included pay increases of approximately 10 per cent and increased health and life insurance benefits.
