Insurance Company of Detroit, has been active in Detroit banking circles since 1916. It was the former manager of the Clearing House Association there. He had been loan and trust officer and vice president of various banks and in 1934 liquidated the trust department of the First National Bank and Trust Co. of Flint, closing out more than 200 trusts with assets of more than \$15,000,000. Recently he has been connected with the federal financing operations in Washington. He is former president of the American Institute of Banking.

Theodore Levin, vice president and general counsel of the new company, was special assistant attorney general in the grand jury investigation of the bank failures in 1933. Other vice presidents are: Fred A. Osanna, Minneapolis corporation lawyer, and Estel Scott, Kansas City, Mo., capitalist. L. C. Cortright, Detroit, secretary, is an attorney in the office of Michigan, graduate and former officer of various life insurance companies. Directors include the officers and Hon. George F. Allen, commissioner of the District of Columbia; William B. Edwards, of Chicago, principal land appraiser of the Housing division, PWA, and J. Earle Brown, Lansing, Mich., attorney and director of the former Detroit Life.

One of the lightest votes in the history of Southfield township was recorded Monday in the primary election when only 138 ballots were cast in the entire township.

The Republicans gave Elmer W. Hignack 122 votes for supervisor, Paulino Adams 129 votes for clerk and Lynn Everett 136 votes for treasurer. Richard Larges received 12 votes for highway commissioner and Edward Stephens received 125. James B. Wood received 23 votes for justice of peace and William Driesner and L. R. Nostrand received 62 and 81 respectively for the constable's post.

Democrats nominated Lester D. Sigard for supervisor with 20 votes and E. Lewis Wright received 19 votes for the office of treasurer.

In true "Merrivell" fashion, Scott, who has been a substitute all season, played three quarters of the game and was high point scorer on the Farmington team. He sank two field goals and a foul shot for a total of five points.

Rick Wilson, Walled Lake veteran, was the offensive and defensive star of the game. He scored nine points.

Farmington's second team also bowed in defeat at the hands of the Walled Lake second team by the score of 19-16. Wilson, Farmington center, was high point man of the game with three field goals and two personal shots.
