

Cranbrook Church Plans Palm Sunday Services

Announcement is made by A. L. MacIntyre, secretary of the Christ Church, Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, that in impressive services called the Festival of Palms, will be held Palm Sunday, April 5, at 11 a. m.

It will be commemorated by a procession of colorfully robed choirs and children carrying palm leaves which they will wave on high during the singing of the hosannas. One of the features of this service is the reading of the Palm Sunday story from the balcony in the narthex of the church as the congregation faces westward.

There will also be a Good Friday Three hours service held from 12 noon to 3 o'clock on the last Friday before Easter, April 10. It will consist of the usual meditations on the last seven words of the Rev. W. Hamilton Aulenbach, plus a series of brief organ meditations by the organist, William Hall Miner, in addition to the usual hymns and prayers.

Sheep Importation of 1802 Nation's Largest

The largest importation of sheep and the one which had the most to do with the improvement of the flocks in this country, was the bringing in of 75 ewes and 21 rams by Davis Humphrey of Connecticut in 1802, writes Carleton M. Allen in the Boston Transcript.

After 1807 merino wool went upwards in price due to the fact that an act was passed, causing practically an embargo, and the seemingly hostile tactics of England and France reduced the imports of wools by at least one-half.

Dupont, another original importer of merino sheep, opened a mill near Wilmington, Del., in 1812. One mill was erected in western Pennsylvania, manufacturing broadcloth from the clip of its own merino sheep.
