**Saginaw Bay Will Be
Stocked with Pike Eggs**

Four to six weeks of feverish activity are in store for state fishery men here as the Bay City hatchery station prepares to handle around a million walleyed pike eggs, obtained by commercial fishermen during the spring pike run in Saginaw Bay.

It is expected the Bay City station will be operated to capacity during this period of time. Last year more than 900,000 walleyed pike eggs were obtained during the spring run in Saginaw Bay, a large part of which was planted directly in the Bay and the remainder placed in jars at the hatchery. Some of the pike hatched here were planted in inland waters.

**Partridge Concentrate
At Houghton Forest**

An unusual concentration of partridge, were observed by Fred A. Westerman and Leo Rector of the department of conservation while driving through the Houghton Lake state forest. In a drive of about 10 miles at dusk they counted 40 partridge budding in trees along the highway.

Tonsorial Brotherhood

Is One of the Oldest
Barbering is one of the oldest of what are sometimes denominated personal occupations. Shaving the head, or some part of it, has been practiced from the earliest times, even among nations which discouraged the shaving of the beard. Etymologically, the term barber, from the Latin word barba (beard), denotes a shaver of the beard; but it soon came that hair-cutting and shaving have usually been accounted one occupation. Shaving is spoken of in Job 1:20; Genesis 31:14; Leviticus 19:27; and Leviticus 19:27, 9, and in several other Old Testament books, but the first place where the barber is directly mentioned is in Ezekiel 5:1: "And thou, son of man, take thee a barber's razor," etc.

Figures on Egyptian and Assyrian monuments, and on some of the oldest of Chinese porcelain show that shaving of the beard and head as a sign of mourning, or submission, or religious devotion, was practiced among all these ancient peoples.

It is plainly impossible to discover the origin of barbering. It is interesting to know that in former times this calling was regarded as a profession, dentistry (at least the lancing of gums and drawing of teeth) and bloodletting and leeching being a part of every first-class barber's business.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Giant's Causeway Made**Up of Number of Columns**

Giant's causeway is a group of basaltic rocks on the north coast of County Antrim, Ireland, eight miles, east northeast of Portrush. It consists of a vast number of columns, generally pentagonal or hexagonal. The causeway proper is a low promontory formed of closely packed columns. Altogether there are about 40,000 pillars, fitting into each other almost perfectly, and joined horizontally.

Various more or less detached groups are known as the Giant's Leap, Giant's Cradle, Lady's Fan and so on. East of the causeway proper is the Giant's Amphitheater, a small bay with cliffs 350 feet high, formed in its upper part of two tiers of basaltic columns from 60 to 80 feet in height. Beyond this is Spanish bay, the scene of the wreck of an armada vessel; and still farther east the promontory of Pieskin Head, 400 feet high, with double tiers of lofty columns separated by a band of ochre. The peculiar columnar structure of the causeway rocks is shown by geologists to result from the contraction in cooling of the lava of which they are composed.

The Giant's causeway derives its name from the legend which attributes its construction to Finn McCool or Fingal, who bridged the channel between Ireland and Scotland, in order that the giants might pass from Antrim to Staffa.

**State Fish Hatcheries
Developing Trout Fry**

Approximately three million lake trout fry are developing at the state fish hatchery here for planting in Great Lakes waters. It is expected that the fry will be planted about the first of May and generally in areas from which the eggs were obtained.

**Conservation Examiners
Find Record Beaver**

While examining beaver carcasses for the department of conservation, B. J. Bujak of Chicago and Lawrence Ball of St. Joseph opened a female beaver that contained 11 embryos. This breaks all known records of number of embryos per beaver. The highest number of embryos previously reported found in a single beaver was nine.

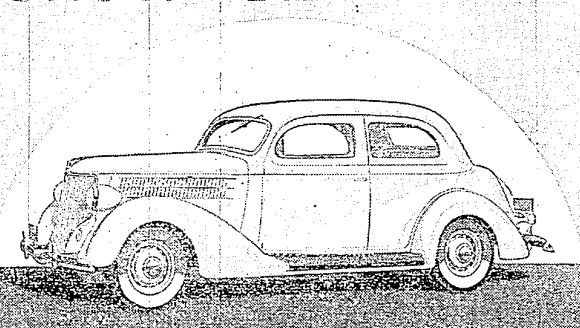
