### Growers Should Spray Peaches for Curl Leaf


According to a Wednesday bulletin from Karl D. Bailey, Oakland County Agricultural Agent, it is time to spray peach trees for curl leaf. The contents of the bulletin read: "As soon as you can get on the soil when the temperature is above freezing, spray with 5 to 7½ gallons of liquid lime-sulphur in water to make 100 gallons of the solution.

"Be sure to make a thorough application. If you have scale use 1½ gallons of liquid lime-sulphur. Indications are that there is not enough scale to warrant the use of 12½ gallons of liquid lime-sulphur nor enough red mite eggs on the peaches to warrant the combined oil and fungicide spray this spring. "If you have not pruned the peach trees, do not do it until they bloom, then you should know how much or how little to cut. Nitrogen fertilizer should be applied as soon as frost is out of the ground. Don't forget to drain sprayer every night as long as we are likely to have freezing weather."

### Minnow License Fees Go To Protection Fund

Approximately 250 commercial minnow licenses have been issued by the department of conservation so far this year. The license fee is \$3. Minnow dealers are reminded that a separate license is required for each minnow stand operated. Receipts of the sale of minnow licenses are placed in the game protection fund which helps finance activities of the Department of Conservation.

### Saginaw Bay Will Be Stocked with Pike Eggs

Four to six weeks of feverish activity are in store for state fisherman here as the Bay City hatchery station prepares to handle around a billion wall-eyed pike eggs, obtained by commercial fishermen during the spring run in Saginaw Bay.

It is expected the Bay City station will be operated to capacity during this period of time.

Last year more than 900,000 wall-eyed pike eggs were obtained during the spring run in Saginaw Bay, a large part of which was planted directly in the Bay and the remainder placed in jars at the hatchery. Some of the pike hatched here were planted in inland waters.

### Partridge Concentrate At Houghton Forest

An unusual concentration of partridge were observed by Fred A. Westerman and Leo Rector of the department of conservation while driving through the Houghton Lake state forest. In a drive of about 10 miles at dusk they counted 40 partridge budding in trees along the highway.

### Tonsorial Brotherhood

#### Is One of the Oldest

Barbering is one of the oldest of what are sometimes denominated personal occupations. Shaving the head, or some part of it, has been practiced from the earliest times, even among nations which disdained the shaving of the beard.

Etymologically, the term barber denotes a shaver of the beard; but it seems that hair-cutting and shaving have usually been accounted one occupation. Shaving is spoken of in Job 1:20; Genesis 1:14; Leviticus 13:33; and Leviticus 14:8, 9, and in several other Old Testament books; but the first place where the barber is directly mentioned is in Ezekiel 5:1: "And thou, son of man, take thee a barber's razor,"

Figures on Egyptian and Assyrian monuments, and on some of the oldest of Chinese porcelains show that shaving of the head and head as a sign of mourning, or subscription, or religious devotion, was practiced among all these ancient peoples.

It is plainly impossible to discover the origin of barbering. It is interesting to know that in former times this calling was regarded as a profession, deserving (at least in law) of dress and draw-  
ing of teeth) and binoculism, and leeching being a part of every first-class barber's business.—Cleveland Plain-Dealer.

### Giant's Causeway Made

#### Up of Number of Columns

Giant's causeway is a group of basalt rocks on the northern coast of County Antrim, Ireland, eight miles, east northeast of Portrush. It consists of a vast number of columns, generally pentagonal or hexagonal. The causeway proper is a low promontory formed of closely packed columns. Altogether there are about 40,000 pillars, fitting into each other almost perfectly, and joined horizontally.

Various more or less detached groups of rocks are also the Giant's Linn, Giant's Orange, Lady's Fan and so on. East of the causeway proper is the Giant's Amphitheater, a small bay with cliffs 350 feet high, formed in its upper part of two tiers of basaltic columns from 60 to 80 feet in height. Beyond this is Spanish bay, the scene of the wreck of an armada vessel and with a portion of the promontory of Brescia Head, 400 feet high, with double tiers of large columns separated by a band of ochre. The peculiar columnar structure of the causeway rocks is shown by geologists to result from the contraction in cooling of the lava of which they are composed.

The Giant's causeway derives its name from the legend which ascribes its construction to Finn MacCoul, the giant who bridged the channel between Ireland and Scotland, in order that the giants might pass from Antrim to Staffa.

### State Fish Hatcheries Developing Trout Fry

Approximately three million lake trout fry are developed at state hatcheries here for planting in Great Lakes waters. It is expected that the fry will be planted about the first of May and generally in areas from which the eggs were obtained.

### Conservation Examiners Find Record Beaver

White examining beaver carcass for the department of conservation, B. J. Bujak of Chicago and Lawrence Ball of St. Joseph opened a female beaver that contained 11 embryos. 
