Thompson, State com-missioner of agricuiture. The quarantine states that all dogs must be securely chained or otherwise confined on the premises. Deputy DeVriedt is empowered to issue a permit for a dog to run at large if the owner can show a cor-tificate proving the dog has been vaccinated against rables within the hast six months.
