Shortages of labor in a number of trades and professions have been reported in certain sections of Michigan according to Major Howard Starret, State Reemployment Director.

"The National Reemployment Service has openings for skilled workers in many fields," Major Starret said. "Besides servicing governmental agencies we are providing a state-wide employment service for private industry."

The types of jobs reported are: type operators, auto body metal finishers, floor molders, wood pattern makers, copper and torch solderers, experienced in auto work die designers, tool designers, auto tankers, wood model builders, and first class auto mechanics.

"Only Michigan men with experience in these lines need apply for the jobs," Major Starret said. "People who are qualified to fill these openings should register at once at the nearest National Reemployment Service office."

A network of district, branch and itinerant offices serve every county in Michigan. People must register in the office serving their county. There is no fee charged for this service.

Mother's Cook Book

MEATS AND OTHER FOODS

AS THE main dish of the dinner is usually some form of meat, fish or fowl, something different is always a delight.

Chicken Almonds.
Cut with shears the raw meat from a three-pound roasting chicken. Cut into cubes. Soak one-half cup of dry mushrooms in one cup of fresh ones. Cut a large mild onion into cubes. Fry one cup of blanched almonds in four tablespoons of peanut oil until crisp and brown, remove from the oil and keep warm. Place the chicken in the hot oil, add mushrooms and onion and one-fourth of a cup of water. Cook until the meat has lost its color, add almonds, and thicken with a tablespoon of soy sauce, one cup of cornstarch and two tablespoons of water. Serve in a bowl, very hot.

Stuffed Shoulder of Lamb.
Elevate the shoulder blade removed from the meat, wipe with a damp cloth to remove any bits of bone. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Fry one small onion in four tablespoons of butter, add one cup of soft bread crumbs, season with salt, pepper and a tablespoon of chopped celery. Mix well and fill the pocket with the stuffing. Put the meat in a roasting pan into a very hot oven to sear the meat well and brown for 15 minutes. Reduce the heat to a moderate oven, add one cup of boiling water and bake 15 minutes to the pound, basting every half hour, adding more water when necessary. Peas are especially good to serve with lamb.

Smothered Broiled Fish.
Broil and chill a fine slice of halibut or salmon. When ready to serve lay on a cold chop plate, surround with cooked chilled string beans; partly cover with a garnish of pickled nasturtium seeds or capers, sliced olives and very small cooked beets arranged ornamentally. Serve with sauce tartare, and at the same meal serve a strawberry shortcake for dessert.

CORN REFUSE ON FIELD SURFACES PROMOTES INCREASE OF CORN BORER

A few corn stalks in a field sown with small grain or other crops may lead to infestation of neighboring plantings by the corn borer. The custom of discing the field before sowing may lead to a 50-fold increase in the borer. Plowing the field before sowing decreases dangers from the borer but is rendered less effective where refuse or a few corn stalks remain on the surface.

"Pieces of refuse harbor and protect the corn borer larvae," Mr. Dibble says. "These borers later develop into moths to fly around and lay eggs in new cornfields. If two borers survive to become moths, they are sufficient to populate a cornfield with 100 borers."

In the experiments, cages were placed on cleanly plowed ground and on fields disced and planted to small grain. No moths were found in the first case. In the second, surface cornstalks furnished shelter and protection to the borers while the growing grain provided shade. Where clean fields were used, borers made their way to the surface but perished from exposure to sun, wind, and rain.

The Wedding Cake
The wedding cake is an institution, dating back at least as far as ancient Rome. The patrician families of Rome provided especially for the marriages of their daughters. In later times in Europe great heaps of small cakes were baked for a wedding feast. A French baker in traveling through England noticed the inconvenience of preparing so many little cakes. He put all the dough in one big pan—thus inventing the wedding cake as it is known today. It is the traditional right of the bride to cut the first slice of the cake. Prosperity and happiness are believed to go with that first piece of the cake.

Meaning of Name "Garret"
